Latino Milwaukee: **A Statistical Portrait**


This year the Greater Milwaukee Foundation commissioned a study by UWM's Center for Economic Development for the first ever, in-depth analysis of social and economic conditions in Milwaukee's Latino Community. "Latino Milwaukee: a Statistical Portrait" provides comprehensive data which examines how Latino Milwaukee has changed through the years and how it compares to other demographics and metro areas. Most importantly, it shines a light on the significant role that the Latino community will play in the future of our city and the region. A FEW HIGHLIGHTS:

- 79.5% of Milwaukee's Latino community are U.S. citizens. 72.8% were born in the U.S.
- Latinos have accounted for over 90% of the net population growth in metro Milwaukee and all of the net population growth in the city of Milwaukee since 2000.
- Without the surge in Latino population since 1990, the city's population would have declined by over 16 % between 1990 and
- Latinos accounted for 25.3% of the City of Milwaukee student enrollment for the 2015-2016 school year.
- Between 2007 and 2012, Hispanic-owned businesses in Milwaukee grew by 82.3%, the 10th highest increase in the 50 largest metropolitan areas.

Salud a la Vista

Studies show Latinos have a higher rate of diabetes compared to the rest of the population, which can lead to vision loss, blindness, and other eye diseases. In an effort to prevent these health complications, a partnership between the United Community Center,



Medical College of Wisconsin (MCW), Milwaukee Department of Health, Carroll University, and Marquette University is creating a new eye disease screening system using mobile technology to improve the eye health of the Latino community in Southeastern Wisconsin.

Thanks to the Healthier Wisconsin Partnership Program (HWPP) Responsive component grant, MCW and UCC will continue to expand their community partnerships and efforts to utilize telemedicine to detect early diabetic retinopathy among the insured and uninsured minority populations of Milwaukee and Waukesha counties. Using a mobile retinal camera that is easy to transport, project leaders hope to create an ongoing program that is community driven. This project partnership also aims to create a diverse and community friendly workforce composed of health science students, public health nurses, and community center staff that can deliver eye screenings to minority populations. The project named Salud a la Vista: mobile TeleEye Health (mTEH), will commence in the new year.

ALUMNI: WHERE ARE THEY NOW? Ana Salas

Although Ana started attending Bruce-Guadalupe Community School in 3rd grade, she didn't find her niche at UCC until after she graduated 8th grade and started high school. Her mom, scared she would fall in with the wrong crowd, brought her to UCC's teen center and introduced her to the program director. After attending several activities she overcame her initial hesitations and grew to love spending time at the center. She became an ambassador of the All Stars Program speaking to other students about the importance of positive goals.

Four years later, she graduated high school and decided to go into criminal justice, but soon found she could have a more direct impact by doing social work. Last year, Ana applied to work for UCC's Human Services

Department and has been working with us full time while also going to school full time. Ana shares, "I love what I do and am extremely honored to make an impact, no matter how small, on those who are looking for a fresh start."

Ana wants to work for UCC for some time, but eventually sees herself working for Child Protective Services and perhaps, in the distant future, she would like to open a group home for battered women and children. Ana is a long-time member of the UCC family and shares, "regardless of what I do, I will always have ties to UCC."

Brian also participated in cycling in the Wellbeats studio, an interactive class simulation that allows patrons to begin classes like kickboxing, Zumba, yoga and Pilates "on demand" with the touch of a button. Some of these classes are even geared towards kids and children, furthering the concept of encouraging participation from all community members.

Students saw the documents that formed our nation at the National Archives, getting an up close look at the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, and the Bill of Rights. They ended the evening in style with a private dance party at Madame Tussauds Wax Museum, where students danced the night away surrounded by past presidents and celebrities!

The final day of the trip brought our nation's history full circle. Students spent the morning at Mt. Vernon, George Washington's home, learning more about the life of our founding president. From there students headed to the White House, getting a look inside the building that houses our President and is a steadfast reminder of country's past, present, and future.

Students headed home with a new understanding of our nation's history, it's struggles, triumphs, and the people who played an integral role in its creation. The memories that were made along the way will be treasured, as it truly was a week that students will never forget.
